Scanning is still relatively new - the ability to scan in an invoice that is jobcosted to an invoice allows the invoice to be archived to the RO, the journal, and the payable ledger. McColl continues, "That's one of the many problems with the third party accounting systems my competitors bolt on to their management systems. They can't record a copy of an invoice right into the journal or the ledger, so you can't reconcile a payables ledger without a box of paper - basically Quick Books represents old technology that my grand mother would literally endorse. Getting rid of the copier - being able to email an invoice to a vendor in seconds - reconciling remotely from say home without a box of paper - this is what state of the art and should be today - this is what CC3 does effortlessly."

Finally - although CC3 is advanced - CC3 is still priced competitively.
